INTRODUCTION

The year 2010 witnessed an historic event for the pro-choice movement. In March, after decades of failed attempts and more than a year of intensive debate, Congress enacted comprehensive health-care reform by passing the Affordable Care Act. The landmark law takes significant steps toward bringing more than 30 million Americans into a health-care system and holds the promise of the greatest expansion of family-planning services and maternity care in a generation. Unfortunately, it also includes alarming new restrictions on women's access to abortion care: the Nelson provisions in the law impose unnecessary burdens on consumers who purchase plans that offer abortion coverage in the new health system. Progress toward improving health care for all Americans should not come at the price of restricting women's access to comprehensive reproductive care.

Beyond health-care reform, a polarized climate in Congress in 2010 hindered progress on other reproductive-rights priorities. The 111th Congress had only 181 fully pro-choice House members out of 435, and 41 of 100 senators. And despite pro-choice leadership in Congress,

anti-choice forces did not shy away from continuing their assaults on reproductive freedom. Prof. Goodwin Liu's nomination to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals lingered for months after the Senate Judiciary Committee voted to advance his confirmation. Prof. Dawn Johnsen, a NARAL staff alumna, withdrew her name from consideration to head the Office of Legal Counsel at the Department of Justice after languishing in confirmation limbo for more than a year, facing near-solid Republican opposition. And finally, before winning Senate confirmation in August, Supreme Court nominee Elena Kagan faced opposition from anti-choice senators for her work in the pro-choice Clinton White House.

NARAL Pro-Choice America's *2010 Congressional Record on Choice* documents the key House and Senate votes taken during the second session of the 111th Congress. In 2010, anti-choice lawmakers continued to attack reproductive rights on the following fronts:

- **Health-Care Reform:** Attacks on abortion coverage continued to the final day of the health-care-reform debate. In a last-ditch effort to derail the legislation, anti-choice Rep. Dave Camp (R-MI) tried to ban abortion coverage altogether in the new system. The effort failed.
- **Attacks on Medical Abortion:** Anti-choice lawmakers continued their campaign against the safe and effective early-abortion pill – known as mifepristone, or RU 486. Sen. Tom Coburn (R-OK) tried to ban the medication from the new health-care system. Thankfully, the effort failed.

In addition, in 2010 anti-choice lawmakers unveiled a far-reaching new legislative attack on choice. Deceptively titled the No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act (H.R.5939), the bill does far more than ban public funding for abortion. It would reduce the availability of abortion coverage in the private insurance market nationwide; impose the core provision of the failed Stupak amendment on the new health system; narrow the already severely limited rape and incest exceptions in the Hyde amendment; and permanently deny low-income women, civil servants, and military women access to this essential medical care, even when their health is at risk. At the time of this publication's printing, the bill had 186 cosponsors.

Despite these attacks on reproductive health, and thanks to a fourth consecutive year of pro-choice leadership in Congress, in 2010 fair-minded lawmakers managed to make progress on a number of fronts:

- **“Abstinence-Only” Programs:** President Obama and Congress continued investing in effective teen-pregnancy prevention programs through FY'11 appropriations legislation, building on the national policy shift the president spurred in 2009 when he proposed eliminating funding for failed “abstinence-only” programs.
- **Women in the Military:** In February, the Department of Defense made public its decision to stock emergency contraception on every overseas military base, finally guaranteeing servicewomen access to a vital medication that can prevent unintended pregnancy. In May, senators on a key committee voted to

repeal the ban on servicewomen using their own funds for abortion services at overseas military hospitals. Unfortunately, anti-choice senators made it clear that they would destruct the entire bill if the repeal provision remained. Therefore, servicewomen's access to safe abortion care was sacrificed in the name of partisan politics.

- **Title X:** Title X (ten), the nation's cornerstone family-planning program for low-income women, was flat-funded for years until Congress—led by pro-choice lawmakers—changed course. In 2010, for the third year in a row, Congress provided a funding boost for this program.
- **Family-Planning Services Overseas:** The U.S. Agency for International Development family-planning account pays for contraceptive services for the world's poorest women. In 2010, Congress continued to grant long-overdue funding increases for this program, reversing years of Bush administration financial neglect.
- **Prevention Agenda:** As described above, in recent years lawmakers achieved several of the pro-choice prevention agenda's goals. Much remains to be done, however, and in 2010 lawmakers continued to promote bills such as the Prevention First Act, the Responsible Education About Life Act, and the Emergency Contraception Education Act, among others.

In 2011, the 112th Congress and its anti-choice House leadership will present formidable obstacles for the pro-choice movement and the

women and men we represent. Despite these challenges, we look to the future with determination. Now we must fight to protect the gains of recent years and continue to defend against looming attacks on reproductive health.

Editor's note: During the years NARAL Pro-Choice America has published a congressional voting record, occasionally the House or Senate has taken only one vote on a reproductive-rights issue during the session. In these instances, NARAL's traditional method of calculating lawmakers' records – by percentage, representing the sum of all the year's votes – does not accurately reflect members' positions on reproductive rights. 2010 is a case in point, with only one vote on reproductive rights in each chamber. In order to address this circumstance, and in keeping with past practice, we have indicated each member's vote with a "Y" or "N" rather than a numerical percentage.



VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

SENATE

Medical-Abortion Coverage Ban. Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, H.R.4872. Coburn (R-OK) amendment to deny medical-abortion (RU 486) coverage to women in the new health system, even those using their own, private funds to purchase health insurance. The amendment failed when a vote on a motion to table (kill) was passed 57 – 42. A pro-choice vote (Y) was in support of the motion to table (3/24/10).

HOUSE

Abortion-Coverage Ban. Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, H.R.4872. Camp (R-MI) motion to recommit the bill with instructions to insert language denying abortion coverage to women in the new health system. The language would prohibit abortion coverage for individuals who receive federal subsidies in the reformed system and make it virtually inaccessible even for women who use their own, private funds. Rejected 199 – 232. A pro-choice vote (N) was against the motion to recommit (3/21/10).
