Subject: Voters In Key States Oppose Supreme Court Nominee Who Would Overturn Roe v. Wade; Senators Who Vote for Such a Nominee Would Face Peril

A new survey by Public Policy Polling in Alaska, Florida, Maine, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, and Texas finds that the majority do not want to see Roe v. Wade overturned, and would oppose any nominee to the Supreme Court who would overturn it. When asked whether or not they would like to see the Supreme Court completely overturn the Roe v. Wade decision, thus invalidating a woman's right to have an abortion, 54% of voters said they would not, compared to only 30% who would like to see the landmark decision overturned – a nearly 2-to-1 margin. 73% of Democrats and 60% of Independents are in favor of protecting Roe v. Wade, only 50% of Republicans support completely overturning the decision and 33% in favor of keeping it.

A majority 55% of voters say they would oppose President Trump nominating someone to the Supreme Court who would vote to completely overturn Roe v. Wade – thus criminalizing abortion - including 79% of Democrats and 62% of independents.

Additionally, the majority 55% of voters said they would be less likely to support their Senator if they voted to confirm a candidate to the Supreme Court who would completely overturn Roe v. Wade and criminalize abortion.

Majorities of both men and women want to see Roe v. Wade protected, with very little difference along gender lines.

PPP surveyed 5,133 voters from Alaska, Florida, Maine, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, and Texas from June 29-July 1, 2018. The margin of error is +/- 1.4%. The polls were conducted by automated telephone interviews on behalf of NARAL Pro-Choice America.
