## Subject: Majority of Kentucky Voters Believe Abortion Should Be Legal

## Date: October 23, 2019

A new Public Policy Polling survey finds that a majority of voters in Kentucky (59\%) believe abortion should be legal and that the government should not prevent a woman from making the decision whether or not to have an abortion for herself. Criminalization of abortion is unpopular among Kentucky voters, with $17 \%$ saying they would only vote for a candidate who supports criminalizing abortion and punishing women who obtain one. The majority ( $77 \%$ ) would either oppose such a candidate, consider a candidate's position on abortion as one of many important factors, or not consider it a major issue in their decision on candidates for Governor.

A majority of voters (55\%) also say they would be more likely to vote for a candidate who would allow abortion later in pregnancy when something during a pregnancy has gone wrong, such as a fetus that cannot survive, danger to a woman's life or health, or other serious circumstances. Only $26 \%$ say they would be less likely to vote for such a candidate.

Key findings from the survey include:

- A majority of Democrats (71\%) and independents (62\%), and 45\% of Republicans in Kentucky believe that abortion should be legal and that the government should not prevent a woman from making the decision for herself.
- A majority of Democrats (62\%) and independents (57\%) and a plurality of Republicans (47\%) are more likely to vote for a candidate who would allow abortion later in pregnancy when something goes wrong, such as a fetus that cannot survive, danger to a woman's life or health, or other serious circumstances.

PPP surveyed 608 Kentucky voters from October 16-17, 2019. The margin of error is +/$4.0 \%$. The survey was conducted by telephone.
